I started taking piano lessons when I was around 12 years old. Elisabeth Kallinger accompanied me for 5 years. I owe her good finger training and learning the basic skills. However, I failed because of the continuous practice because I found joy in improvising early on and immediately made my own music out of every score I had to learn.

Florian Kreißl (born 2005, Austria) started at the age of 13, independently, self-taught, to generate music on the computer. He has already taken part in international remix competitions twice on an equal footing with experienced producers. Inspired by the exchange in the Internet community, he found his own style. His younger brother, Raphael, (born 2011, Austria) was also extremely skilful with his first music creations and eagerly followed in the footsteps of his older brother.



Words of a musical astronaut - on the works of this collection

Inspired by both classical and contemporary music, mainly choral works, (to name a few: Chopin, Ēriks Ešenvalds, Brahms, Mozart, Philip Glass, John Williams, Hans Zimmer, Ludovico Einaudi, Puccini, and many more) I set moods for the day, impressions, Feelings, weather phenomena, the laughter of my children or even a normal working day musically.

The musical ideas come unexpectedly and literally flow through my hands into the instrument. An active steering of the melodies takes place very rarely because the spontaneous improvisation should flow unchecked in your freedom. The artistic intervention consists in being able to memorize and reproduce the pieces to a certain extent and then to take them up and summarize them thematically in a context.

The title is based on a topic from the years 2019-2020 that had influenced me the most. "Science Fiction" and its film-technical implementation, among others "The 100", "The expanse", "Star Wars - Mandalorian" and "Interstellar" also offer unmistakable film music. The universe and astronomy have always fascinated me, as well as fantastic film music suitable for this genre. Have fun on a musical excursion into a world that has never been discovered before! Unfold the table in front of you, put your legs up, buckle up! It starts when you press "Play" on your remote control!


Das Instrument



A grand piano by J. Czapka's Sohn (Jacob Czapka (founded 1842), Vienna; his son, also Jakob, had apparently taken over the company)

The full wording: J.Czapka's son imperial and royal court piano manufacturer and chamber supplier - Vienna; the serial number indicates an approximate year of construction of 1860. (Age: 156 years).

Construction: upright piano, Viennese mechanism. Due to the Viennese mechanism, the touch itself is rather hard and stiff, but once the instrument is well tuned, a warm, honey-like sound is created that is very radiant in the highs and very sonorous metallic in the lows. The instrument has been lovingly restored and tuned by the Vienna Piano Gallery and Peter Kreißl.

Our spaceship is now floating alone in space. Our quantum drive is deactivated; we look around and look for our next destination.


"Off to the Orion Nebula in the constellation of Orion!" - It is listed as number 42 in the Messier * catalog and is considered a jewel in the northern winter sky. The Orion Nebula is the birthplace of many stars, high-energy gases, nebulae and radioactivity make the star crib shine.



* Charles Messier (born June 26, 1730 in Badonviller (Lorraine), † April 12, 1817 in Paris) was a French astronomer. Among other things, he worked as an astronomer in the French Navy and later in the Bureau des Longitudes and is considered the discoverer of 20 comets. In addition, with the Messier catalog, he created a directory, later named after him, of astronomical objects such as galaxies, star clusters and nebulae.


Track 5 Florian Kreißl **Jungle**

Track 7 Peter Kreißl Shift orbit – Wechsle den Orbit – cambio de orbita

When a spaceship is in orbit, the direction of movement cannot change suddenly. One speaks of a transfer from one orbit to the next. Orbits are alternated in a spiral until the new direction and height fit ... Comparable to a balloon, which depends on where the wind is blowing and how high it has to rise to use the wind. It is similar in music. Chords and harmonies always need leading tones and intermediate steps to be able to reach a new harmony or key.

Even the sharpest edges of the universe can be reached at the speed of light.

The modulated strings create a galactic atmosphere and are combined with limitless synthesizer sounds.
